FRIENDS OF NEVADA STATE MUSEUM LAS VEGAS



Friends, members, and supporters:

2023 was a year of positive change for the Nevada State Museum, Las Vegas. The biggest positive was the rebuilding of the staff to numbers approaching the pre-pandemic period. For the first time in several years, curator openings were filled; the maintenance and exhibitions staff was increased; and support positions were filled. Nothing makes the Friends happier than a full staff focused on improving museum activities and actively engaging with the public.

While the museum staff was being rebuilt, the Friends maintained fundraising and support activities, reaching new highs in a number of areas:

- Total funds raised \$46,819
- Two major grants were received \$20,000 from the county and \$10,000 from the Lanie Albrecht Foundation.
- The Friends made major donations to the museum: manuscript scanner (2022 campaign); two large historical paintings that had hung in the museum prior to 2011; and an 1840's Rio Grande historical blanket for the Spanish Trail Exhibition.
- The Friends financially supported the Liberace exhibition, including the gala opening event.

Our major challenge remains to increase Friends membership and to attract younger members for new leadership positions.

Throughout the year, the Friends mission remained constant: Encourage, foster, and assist Nevada State Museum, Las Vegas programs and activities by volunteering, fundraising, and promoting community interest in the museum.

The museum staff is actively developing new long term goals for the future, including new exhibitions, community involvement activities, and new artifact requirements. As these evolve, the Friends specific goals will also change to support the museum's strategic direction.

During 2024, the Friends fundraising efforts will be focused on:

- Maintain and expand relationships with the OAG staff and the Lanie Albrecht Foundation in order to meet their objectives and obtain future grants.
- Work to obtain 1-2 new grants
- Hold the autumn auction, maintaining relationships with all current donors. Establish a stronger corporate commitment to the auction.
- Manage one major campaign during the summer to raise funds for a major artifact purchase for the museum.
- Hold three paint events at Pinot's Palette.
- Continue efforts with members for dues payment and participation in meeting events.

Grant Activities

- Awarded a \$20,000 grant by Clark County for "Museum in a Box" and "Discovery Saturday" activities.
- Provided "Museum in a Box" visits for over 15,000 students from 73 different schools.
- Hosted over 2,800 participants in "Discovery Saturdays."
- Donated \$1,200 to provide museum giveaways for students attending field trips (bookmarks, pencils). More than 5,300 students attended, with 80% attending in the October to December period as field trips returned to full activity.
- Awarded a second \$10,000 grant by the Lanie Albrecht Foundation for education activities.
- Established an annual fund of \$1,500 for museum staff development/training.
- Provided over \$3,000 in supplies to the education department.

General Activities

- Red Rock Canyon bus tour for members
- Purchased and donated display artifacts to the museum:
 2 historical paintings; 1840's Rio Grande blanket
- Developed our summer auction to focus on experiences in the Las Vegas area. Developed contacts and relationships with about 40 companies/museums. The auction was smaller, more focused, and more successful.
- Donated over \$1,100 to various museum areas to cover the costs of basic items outside of their budget (archive folders, maintenance supplies, etc.).
- Provided funding for the Liberace exhibit and for the exhibition grand opening reception.
- Mounted a continuously running TV on the wall next to the announcement board to improve communications to all visitors.
- Published 5 newsletters.
- Supplied funding and covered monthly costs to upgrade the museum's external communication platform.
- Supported the fall new Clark County School District teacher orientation session.
- Supported the store with new display stands and supplies to be sold.

The year 2023 saw continued growth and contribution by the Friends to the museum

- · Artifact purchases and contributions (Rio Grande blanket).
- Exhibition support (Liberace exhibition and opening reception).
- Education programs (Day of the Dead activities).
- Operational supplies (store display stands and archival folders).
- · Museum in a Box and Discovery Saturdays.

These activities required \$40,000+ in expenses. This could not have been achieved without the support of all Friends members and donors. The board thanks you for your support in all these endeavors. We continue to be pleased and gratified by your support for all the activities the board has chosen to pursue.

A real positive for 2023 (and a continuation of 2022) has been the rebuilding of the museum staff to pre-pandemic levels. The board has been impressed with the staff additions and is pleased with their openness to working with the Friends. The board believes the staff is poised to do great things in the future to improve the museum's offerings and outreach.
